## Families and Leapfrog Learning Together

### Chat, Play, Read

We'd like to introduce the 'Chat, Play, Read' scheme. Rolled out by the National Literacy Trust to promote and provide guidance and tips on how to support your child's early language development at home.

Chatting together about everyday activities, playing and cosying up with a book are fun. These are also excellent ways to enable development of these early language skills which will form the building blocks for their future learning.

A booklet designed for parents to use at home is available to view online [here](#) with details of age related activities linked to chat, play, read. There is also the option of signing up to the 'Words for Life' family newsletter. Hardcopies of the booklet are also available in our foyer.

To provide more insight into this initiative we'll be running evening Communication and Language workshops for parents. The first will be held on Tuesday 11th March from 18:45-20:30 for parents of children under 3. Our second workshop for over 3's will follow early in the Summer term.

Portsmouth City Council Early Years team are rolling out their own version of the scheme which we will be sharing with you. Look out for our updated 'Leapfrog and Families Learning Together' board for further details and tips to support your child as they practice their literacy skills at home and bolster what they are learning in nursery.

## Toddler Room

December was a very exciting month as we celebrated Christmas together, including our party when parents joined us for some festive activities and tasty party snacks. We loved sharing this with you and hope you enjoyed yourselves as much as we did!



Recognising that toddlers simply can't resist messy play we are introducing a variety of play activities to engage your child's senses this term - providing them with a developmental opportunity using smell, taste, touch, sound and sight to further their understanding of the world and how they can interact within it.

Toddlers showed how much they love a water activity as they excitedly splashed, scooped and poured citrus water in and out of different containers and discovered the lemon and lime slices, touching and squeezing the fruit and exploring it with their mouths. Safe to say they found the taste sour and for those who have never tasted lemon or lime before it certainly was an experience!

They've also enjoyed feeling the different textures as they've searched for the animals hidden amongst the cooked spaghetti and painting using different materials and tools.



Messiest of all was the foam! Using paint brushes to mix the foam and crazy soap before 'painting' designs and delighting in manipulating and exploring the mixture with their hands.

Play dough is another fabulous sensory activity which you may enjoy making and playing with together at home. Knowing that toddlers tend to explore with their mouths, we wanted to share the advice that we follow to reduce health risks of consuming raw flour which you may not be aware of. ## Two-Three Room

This term children have been enjoying our new focus book 'Old MacDonald Had a Farm' joining in with the rhyme as they learn about different farm animals and sounds. We have introduced a Farm Shop role play area where children will have the opportunity to shop for fruit and vegetables which they can then 'cook' in their new kitchen. Since it was installed, children have been excitedly chatting with their friends as they engage and develop their language, communication and social skills as they explore the new appliances and role play together.



These activities have been a fun way of introducing words relating to animals, fruit, vegetables and cooking. As the term progresses we'll be helping children develop their language skills by extending their vocabulary beyond the objects by adding one related descriptive word such as 'big, small, soft, heavy'.

With Chinese New Year, Valentines Day and Shrove Tuesday coming up this term we thought this was the perfect time to provide children with some seasonal cooking experiences. Rolling out and cutting biscuit dough, decorating cakes and making pretend pancakes using flour and water we are looking forward to some very tasty treats!

For World Book Day week activities will continue to support language development around the theme of cooking and foods related to the Very Hungry Caterpillar which is always popular with the children.

Continue the learning at home by adding a descriptive word to object vocabulary. Using real objects and actions helps your child visualise the meaning of the description. For example, allow your child to hold a heavy object and a light object and show your child a large and a small object together using words to describe each in turn.

## Pre-School Room

We had a fabulously festive December which we were delighted to share with both the children and families. This term is equally packed with more engaging activities relating to children's interests supporting their learning around early numeracy and in particular, number recognition from 1-5.

It's been a noisy but fun start to the term as children have been enjoying the rhythm and rhyme of the story "Tanka Tanka Skunk!" beating their drums as they practice counting the syllables of the different characters names of Tanka and his friends.

Children have been excitedly following the adventures of Evil Pea and the hero 'Supertato' in our focus book and visiting our pre-school 'Supertato Supermarket' in our role play area. Children have been busy little shoppers and shopkeepers matching the quantity of products to the number of items on our list, as well as using early mark making to tick off the items as we go.

During the term children will be able to develop their woodwork skills. Referring to the numbered steps in their 'Pre-school Woodwork Manual' they are learning number sequencing as they tick off their progress as they master each stage as well as matching the number of nails to quantity as they learn to hammer. We can't wait to see all their skills come together as they build their own constructions.



Continue the learning at home, helping your child associate their knowledge of numbers with counting objects during your day-to-day activities such as: asking them to collect a number of objects to add to the trolley; at dinner time ask them to lay out a number of utensils on the table; when cooking ask them to count and match the number of items to the number of ingredients in the recipe before adding them.

# **Important Health and Safety Information**

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### **Collections**

During the Winter months it takes a little longer to dress your child ready for collection due to the additional layers. Please help us have your child ready for a swift collection by advising when you will be collecting your child and contacting the nursery as soon as possible should timings change.

A reminder that collection times are as follows:  
4:00, 4:30, 5:00, 5:30 and anytime up to 6:00pm

### **Temperature Policy**

Recently children have been attending nursery following the administration of Calpol to reduce temperatures. Masking symptoms in this way leads to transfer of infection to other children and staff, with children also feeling unwell when the medication wears off.

Please help us reduce the risk of infection in the nursery by keeping children at home if they have a temperature above 37.8c, even where Calpol has been administered.

### **Unsafe items in Nursery bag**

Recently we have become aware that children's bags have contained unsafe items from home that could pose a risk to other children in the nursery.

It is really important that your child's bag has been checked prior to each visit. Especially when it has been used for other occasions between nursery days.

### **Mobile and Food Policy**

Just a reminder that mobile phone usage is not permitted in the Nursery.

To help us manage children's allergies we request that children finish any foodstuffs prior to entering the building and do not bring food into their rooms.
